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## CALL FOR FELLOWSHIP APPLICANTS

Public Counsel's Audrey Irmas Project for Women and Girls' Rights works to create more equitable and just conditions at school and in the workplace for cis- and transgender women, girls, and non-binary individuals because we believe that everyone deserves the chance to learn, grow, and thrive with safety, dignity, and respect. Working at the intersection of gender, race, disability, and socioeconomic status, the Women and Girls' Rights Project advances worker justice and education equity through a unique combination of trauma-informed direct legal services, policy advocacy, impact litigation, and community education.

The Women and Girls' Rights Project has primarily focused on two areas: workplace justice and opportunity (including addressing discrimination and sexual harassment in the workplace), and equity and empowerment for young women and girls (including addressing sexual harassment and assault in educational contexts).

Applications for those proposing Equal Justice Works or Skadden fellowship projects to begin in fall 2024 should be submitted by July 1, 2023. Applications for those proposing other fellowship projects to begin in fall 2024 should be submitted as soon as possible and will be reviewed on a rolling basis.
